### TRANSCRIPT 1

One of the most famous and **prestigious** marathons in the world is the Boston Marathon, which is held every year in April. The first time the Boston Marathon was held was in 1897 and according to the Boston Athletic Association it is the world's oldest **annual** marathon.

In its very first year just 18 people entered the race, but the numbers have grown **dramatically** over the course of its long history and in 2018 there were just over 30,000 entrants.

The first time money was awarded was in 1986. Men and women receive the same amount and in 2018 the top prize in the 'Open' division was \$150,000. Second and third place finishers received \$75,000 and \$40,000 respectively.

The first Boston Marathon where women were officially allowed to enter was the 1972 race. That year 9 women entered, 8 started, and 8 completed the course. Prior to 1972, some women did actually run the race and the first to finish the whole course was Roberta Gibb in 1966. Gibb also ran in 1967 and 1968.

### TRANSCRIPT 2

In 1980 an **unusual** event took place. The first person to cross the line in the women's category didn't actually run the entire distance. In fact, it was eventually discovered that she had only run the last mile or so. The woman was **disqualified** and Jacqueline Gareau from Canada was awarded the victory.

The 2013 edition of the Boston Marathon was severely impacted by two explosions that happened close to the finish line, killing 3 people and injuring several hundred. The Boston Athletic Association explains that more than 5,000 runners were given projected finishing times as they were not able to complete the course due to the incident.

When it comes to the winners of the famous race, runners from Kenya have enjoyed a considerable amount of success. Take for example 1991-2000, when Kenyans won 10 races in a row. As for Japan, Japanese men have won a total of 9 times, the first time in 1951 and the most recent in 2018. As of the 2018 race, no Japanese woman has ever won the Boston Marathon.
