TRANSCRIPT 1

Boasted as the 3rd largest sporting event in the world next to the Olympics and FIFA World Cup, the Rugby World Cup is the sport's most challenging and prestigious event. Hosted once every four years, the Rugby World Cup is comprised of 20 teams, split into 4 pools of 5 teams, with a total of 48 matches being played overall. The top two teams automatically qualify for the next stage of the tournament and a shot to win the number 1 crown in international rugby.

The road to the Rugby World Cup is not the same for all teams. 12 teams are automatically qualified due to their past world cup performances; however, the remaining 8 spots are decided from a total of 80 other nations. Those 80 teams have to go through a complicated series of regional play-off games and tournaments to get a chance to participate in the World Cup.

The 2019 Rugby World Cup has already encountered some controversy as Romania, who had qualified for the tournament, were found to have fielded **ineligible** players. This led to their **expulsion** from the tournament and Russia taking their place. History has shown that the sport is dominated by only a few teams. New Zealand, England, South Africa and Australia are the only teams who have won the tournament.

TRANSCRIPT 2

Japan is home to the 4th largest Rugby Union population in the world, with 3,631 official teams and over 125,000 registered players. Despite the game being played in Japan for over a hundred years, it is still considered a minor sport and is ranked the 5th most popular team sport.

Rugby was born at Rugby School in Rugby, Warwickshire, England and was first introduced into Japan in the late 1860s as a game mainly played by servicemen. Professor Edward Bramwell Clark and Ginnosuke Tanaka, both Cambridge University graduates and lecturers at Keio University, introduced the game to their students in 1899; however, it took until the 1920s before the game's popularity grew. Prince Chichibu, named the 'Sporting Prince,' **championed** the rise of the sport as the president of the JRFU, and to this day the Chichibunomiya Rugby Stadium in Tokyo **bears** his name.

Created in 2002, Japan's professional league, 'Top League,' is dominated by company sponsored teams; however, the popularity and fanbase remains at university level. The annual game between Keio and Waseda Universities draw crowds of over 40,000 people, and the All-Japan University Rugby Championships has over 800 teams competing for the top prize. With the rise of the Sunwolves professional team and Japan's hosting of the 2019 World Cup, Rugby Union in Japan looks set to continue its evolution.
