#### **TRANSCRIPT 1**

Pringles are a potato and wheat-based snack developed by Procter & Gamble. To **address** consumer complaints about greasy, broken and stale chips, Procter and Gamble assigned chemist Fredrick Baur to **formulate** a new potato snack in 1956. Although Fredrick was able to come up with a saddle-shaped chip that fit into a tubular can, he couldn't make the chips taste good. Almost a decade later Procter & Gamble was finally able to produce a tasty chip named "Pringles" which were first sold in 1968.

The original name was "Pringle's Newfangled Potato Chips." The name "Pringles" came from a Cincinnati telephone book when they found a street called Pringle Drive in Finneytown, Ohio. Fredrick Baur passed away on March 4th, 2008 at the age of 89. Since he was passionate about his invention, he requested to be cremated and a part of his ashes to be buried in a Pringles can. His family **honored** this request.

As of 2016, Pringles are sold in over 140 countries. On May 31st, 2012 the Kellogg Company **acquired** the Pringles brand for \$2.695 billion.

#### **TRANSCRIPT 2**

Pringles come in standard flavors such as Barbecue, Cheddar Cheese, Cheese & Onion, Original and Salt & Vinegar among others. In the Japanese market they have released some unique flavors including Green Thai Curry and Cheese and Mayo. There are hundreds of different types of flavors worldwide, with 33 regularly available flavors in the U.S. market alone.

In 1975 the United States Food and Drug administration ruled that Pringles failed to meet the definition of a "potato chip." Since then Pringles have been marketed as "potato crisps" in the U.S. In the London High Court in July 2008, Procter & Gamble lawyers successfully **argued** that Pringles were not potato chips, as their actual potato content was only 42%. This excluded Pringles from the 15% value-added tax for potato chips, but later in 2009 the court reversed their decision and implemented the tax on Pringles.

The Pringles brand is now finding itself as the main target in the tubular stackable chip market. In 2003 snack maker Frito Lay decided to introduce a similar product called "Lays Stax" to directly compete with Pringles. Stax chips are heavier and **sturdier** than Pringles and come in a plastic tube, as opposed to Pringles which uses a cardboard and aluminum tube. However as of 2019 Lays Stax has only released a total of 27 different flavors, which is far less than the wide range of choices Pringles provides.
