TRANSCRIPT 1

From blockbuster movies to theme parks, comic book culture has entered **mainstream** society in a big way over the last decade. However, comics have not always enjoyed such success. Fans of this **medium** wanted to create a space where like-minded people could gather, **hence** the emergence of comic book conventions.

Two of the major comic book conventions are Comic-Con and Comiket. Comic-Con started in 1970 in San Diego, California and was originally focused primarily on science fiction and fantasy media, with a heavy spotlight on comics. It has gradually expanded over the years to include products related to gaming, anime, films and other forms of popular culture.

Japan holds another major comic book convention called Comiket. Similar to Comic-Con it is non-profit, but differs in that it primarily features fan-created works and publications. The works are known as dojinshi and the authors are referred to as dojin. There is of course a corporate **presence** at the event but the majority of works are produced by "circles," or amateur author groups. There is an average of 35,000 circles present each year. Despite the differences between the two events, both share features in common such as a strong connection to cosplay.

TRANSCRIPT 2

Cosplay, a combination of the terms costume and play, is a social **phenomenon** where fans dress up in elaborate costumes based on characters from popular culture including comics. Due to the **overlapping** of source material, Comic-Con and Comiket both have a robust cosplay presence. Comic-Con even has an annual cosplay competition where the best costumes of the year are recognized. It has become so popular that there are now conventions dedicated specifically to cosplay.

As with all popular phenomena, there is a financial side to cosplay as well. One of the premier cosplayers in Japan, Enako, stated in 2017 that she made close to 1 million yen per month from her cosplay appearances alone. Cosplayers seek to make money through appearances, social media posts and photo shoots. Costumes can represent a significant investment for them as top-tier designs can run into the thousands of dollars.

The relationship between cosplay and conventions is mostly a beneficial one; however there have been a few **snags**. Events have had to designate specific areas and rules for cosplay to avoid congestion and protect the safety of the cosplayers as well.
